Sikkim's Rabbit Hole

Alice had to take a courageous leap into the rabbit hole to see all logic get skewed out of rationality. In Sikkim, all it takes for perceptions to get warped is the whiff of an election. The rose-tinted alasses that colour the Sikkimese inference of events through four years, suddenly turn into blinkers which block out every thing save caste considerations and communal exigencies. During an election year, everything becomes of dire importance. The rising crime graph suddenly starts shocking people; incidents which people had forgotten start hurting again; too many inferences are cast on ordinary conversations and people start seeing monsters in their own shadows. May be this is how people in most states react to elections, but given the ridiculously small number of voting population in Sikkim, the insular divisions that people start compartmentalising themselves into becomes too claustrophobic for comfort. It goes without saying that this trend is unhealthy, but that is what politics has been reduced to - a numbers game of vote-banks and vote-shares. While all the scheming and planning that goes into appropriating such vote-banks might be the only resort left for leaders who surface only once in a while when elections are round the corner, they remain something that the masses should remain distant from. It is they who will have to live with all the bad-blood that they have created among themselves after the real beneficiaries of the divide have bagged important portfolios or switched sides.

So what do the people do?

It is all very easy to say that since it is the people who elect the leaders, they can effect a change in their mind-set too. The pyramid of power is too inverted for such a change to come any time soon. In the meanwhile, the people can just kick back and enjoy the show. Enjoy the free rides to bigger towns, the free lunches and pocket money, but don't get suckered into aligning along partisan lines that some will definitely want them to. Sikkim has failed to meet many of its long-pending demands because the support for them was segregated. If any community is serious about getting their voice heard, they will have to also cull support from other sections of the population. By themselves, when they think they are speaking out, they are only playing Chinese whisper. The message gets too wrapped in a communal colour by the time it reaches Delhi or even Mintokgang for that matter apart from the fact that it is barely audible. As Sikkim prepares to jump into its rabbit hole, remember, Alice's story might have been fun to read, it must have been a frightening experience for the protagonist herself. Does Sikkim want to go through that horror?

Cong uses Rhenock double-murder whip to flay SDF

GANGTOK: The Sikkim Pradesh Congress Committee-I [SPCC] has expressed "deep anguish and regret" over the twin murder of minor girls in Rhenock on 11 January.

SPCC-I spokesman Biraj Adhikari, in a press statement, while extending the Congress's "heartfelt condolences and deep regret" to the bereaved families, has demanded "maximum possible punishment" for the accused.

Blaming the present SDF government for the "rapidly deteriorating law and order" in the State, Congress said that the indient at Rhenock "reflected the irresponsibility of the Chamling-led Government and its failure towards maintaining law and order in the State."

"The number of heinous crimes that occur everyday in the State and the rising crime rate in the last ten years of SDF rule is alarming, given the area and population of State in comparison to other States in the country. It reflects the failure of

the SDF government," the press statement reads.

While also criticising the present government for "failure to bring justice to the people" in most of the crimes committed in the State in recent times, the Congress has demanded that all those accused booked for such heinous crimes be brought to justice immediately.

SIBLAC RAISES NATHULA ISSUE WITH CI

GANGTOK: The Sikkim Bhutia Lepcha Apex Committee [SIBLAC] has once again brought out the Nathula trade issue and its presumable impact on the demography of the State, this time, directing its "apprehension" to the Confederation of Indian Industries [CII].

On the eve of the CII seminar on the proposed reopening of Nathula pass for trade in Siliguri on January 16, SIBLAC, in a letter to the Chairman. CII, siened by ruling party MLA and SIBLAC convenor, Tseten Tashi Bhutia, SIBLAC expressed its "apprehensions" on the "issues of safeguards of minority Bhutia-Lepcha" of the State, and its "stands on the reopening of Nathula" for trade.

"One of the main factors responsible for the present resentment among the Sikkimese, particularly among the indigenous minority Bhutia-Lepcha people is the influx and presence of large number of emigrants from outside of the State, neighbouring countries in particular - Nepal and Tibet - which have caused immense

social, political, economic and ethnic imbalance in the State. The Nathula trade will encourage more influx... the issue must take due cognisance of the changing demography of Sikkim and displacement of Bhutia-Lepcha people from their ancestral land," the letter read.

SIBLAC has further said in the letter that the "impact of changing demography in Sikkim has been the worst" among all the North-eastern states in the country and has expressed "great concern" over the "number of outsiders that is growing at an explosive and unsustainable pace."

"The increase in population due to influx has increased the burden of dependency and reduced resources of the State. The present rate of growth, if not moderated will have frightening implications on the socio-politico security of the minority Bhutia-Lepcha in particular and Sikkimese people in gen-



eral," it said.

Reiterating that SIBLAC was "not against" any development activity or the opening of Nathula, the letter stresses that development activities should be "peoplecentric" and not "displace" them from their own land.

SIBLAC further said that CII should take note of three points before opening of Nathula for trade, which should be "deemed absolutely necessary." These points are - restoring original definition of "Bhutia" by amending the Scheduled Tribes/Castes Orders [Amendment' Act, 2003; safe-guarding the political rights of Bhutia-Lepcha people by amending the Representation of People's [Amendment' Act, 1980 and delimiting reserved constituencies of BLS to ensure their genuine representation in the State Assembly.

Pulse Polio immunisation reaches 67,520 children

GANGTOK: A total of 67,520 children have been vaccinated under the Intensified Pulse Polio Immunisation Programme in the State since September 2003.

According to an activity report issued by the Department of Health & Family Welfare, after the three rounds of Pulse Polio immunization programme conducted in September and November 2003 and January 2004, the

State is reaching impressive figures in the drive to eradicate polio from the State.

In the East District, a total of 28,143 children were given polio drops against 16,737 children in the West District, 5,464 in the North and 17,176 in the South District.

The figures also reveal that the vaccination booths set up during the designated immunization days are proving to be more successful. Out of the 67,520 children vaccinated, 63,451 children were administrated polio drops at the booths

SDF CENTRAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE CLEARS PROPOSAL TO HOLD SIMULTANEOUS POLLS; MANIFESTO COMMITTEE SUBMITS DRAFT

CAMPAIGN ON OUR STRENGTHS, NOT THE OPPOSITION'S WEAKNESSES, CHAMLING TELLS HIS CADRE

GANGTOK: It is not yet "official," but as close to "final" as it can get. Sikkim will go in for simultaneous Assembly polls when the nation conducts the general elections sometime in April this year. The party nod to opt for simultaneous polls was given at a 4-hour long central executive meeting of the ruling Sikkim Democratic Front held here on 20 January, Tuesday.

While talk of early polls [the ruling SDF's term ends only in November] has been making the rounds for quite some time now, it was only with the ruling party's CEC meeting that it has become certain. The party, however, was apparently serious about the prospect as was made obvious on Tuesday when, apart from the nod for simultaneous polls, the CEC meeting also saw the SDF Mani-

festo Committee submit a draft proposal to the Chief Minister.

The campaigning, inform party sources, will begin in February. Adding a wicked twist to the launch of its election campaign, the party has reportedly decided to start from Rhenock - the Opposition leader Nar Bahadur Bhandari's constituency which supported him even when his traditional stronghold, Soreong, fell to SDF in the last polls.

These overt shows of strength apart, Mr. Chamling does not appear to be in the mood to contribute to the Opposition's publicity in Sikkim. Speaking to the executive members of his party on Tuesday, he urged them to campaign of the ruling party's strengths and not the Opposition's weaknesses.

In his 2-hour speech, the party president reiterated that the Opposition "did not hold much water in Sikkim" and that the campaign trail should be directed more at reaching SDF's message and its performance to the people than highlighting the obvious chinks in the Opposition's armour.

While calling on senior party members to now focus on contributing towards the party's poll prospects, Mr. Chamling said the time had come for everyone to work in earnest to return SDF to power.

With the decision on early polls cleared, can talk of possible candidates be far behind?

Informed sources reveal that there will be some new faces introduced in the upcoming polls. There are also many in the party ranks who feel they have now grown in popularity and performance to deserve a party ticket. With 31 of 32-member legislative assembly wearing the SDF colours, ticket distribution is definitely something that will require a delicate balancing act by the Chief Minister.

Incidentally, Mr. Chamling, at the CEC meeting, also made it clear that the tickets will be decided "by the party" and that there was no need for "delegations" to approach him supporting the candidature of different leaders. "Party workers should

GANGTOK: It's final now, come April and Sikkim will go in for simultaneous polls. In barely two months time. Hectic electioneering will now begin in the earnest and new permutations and combinations will be tried out as contenders to the next government work out arrangements to best buttress their shot at power.

Every political party will obviously claim that it is "ready." No one can go about asking for votes without at least putting across a confi-

dent face. That apart, it takes more than just for the political parties to be ready. The election machine is a colossal one and every cog has to fall into place before elections can be held. A case in point is the Andhra Pradesh experience where even though the government was dissolved long back, elections are still awaited thanks to the Election Commission's wet blanket on Chandrababu Naidu's plans.

No such speed-breaker seems possible in Sikkim with the State Election Department confident that it can have everything in place by April.

"We are preparing ourselves for the polls. Even though we have not received any formal directives from New Delhi yet, we have indications of an early poll," said Deputy Chief Electoral Officer, CP Dhaka said, while talking to NOW! Needless to add, preparations for the general elections he was talking about and state elections, which is now going to be simultaneous, are the same.

The Department is presently involved in completing the revision of electoral rolls and issuing photo identity cards. The photo voters cards have been made mandatory for the April elections. "We carried out the summary revision of the electoral rolls. The final revised electoral rolls is expected to be out on January 20 [Tuesday]," Mr. Dhakal said.

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We will ride the anti-incumbency factor to power: Thukchuk

GANGTOK: "Yes we are. If the polls are scheduled for April or even earlier, say in end-March, the Congress is prepared for it." Thukchuk Lachungpa, vice-president and in-charge, General Elections, SPCC [I] said when asked whether his party was prepared for early polls in Sikkim.

In fact, the Congress seems all too eager to step into the election arena and take on the SDF in what it feels will be a closely fought match. These polls will also reveal how well the voters have taken in the Bhandari-led SSP-Congress merger. The polls will also be taken as a barometer to measure Mr. Bhandari's grassroots appeal and whether the Sikkimese voters will accept a national party. Con-

gress, or for that matter any national party, has never been voted to power in Sikkim. They have only appropriated power through mergers and defections thus far.

But, the Congress is confident that they will emerge winners.

"The anti-incumbency factor will play a major role during the elections this time. The Congress is presently enjoying a popularity wave under the leadership of Mr. Bhandari never before seen in the State. People want a change and we are offering them just that," Mr. Lachungpa said.

The Congress, already in the cam-

paign mode, is promising an "attractive" package to the people that promises "much more" than good governance.

"Our election agenda will focus on issues such as security, unity, communal harmony and fulfillment of all the promises. We want to give the people resultoriented schemes and not those are populist measures," Mr. Lachungpa said.

The party will contest candidates from all 32 seats. "Candidates will be given tickets on the basis of their loyalty towards the party and their winnability factor," he said.

The party also goes back to the vote-share of the last elections. With Cong [I] having bagged some 4 per cent votes and another 44 per cent of the votes that were cast in support of the then Bhandari-led SSP, they are hopeful that some careful realignments, they will

be able to swing the elections in their favour.

Apart from Cong [I], the ruling SDF will have some competition from smaller players in the State. The new-look BJP, its NDA ally at the Centre, and other parties like Sikkim Himali Rajya Parishad have already started working towards the elections. Then there is also the breakaway SSP faction. None has created any waves in elections thus far and as things stand the April elections, both to the Lok Sabha and the State Legislative Assembly, will be a direct confrontation between the two giants of Sikkim politics, Mr. Bhandari and Mr. Chamling.




instead focus on the campaigning from now on," he said.

Incidentally, another decision taken at the CEC with the elections in mind was to hold the SDF Day at one venue this year. The day was being observed at the constituency level thus far. Sources reveal that the SDF Day, which falls on 4 March, will probably be held at Rangpo Mining Ground. The decision on a single venue should provide the ruling party with a opportunity to make a public statement of its support base. Minister Health, DD Bhutia, has been appointed the Chairperson of the SDF Day Organising Committee.

Also in preparation of the poll campaign, Lok Sabha MP, Bhim Dahal, has been appointed the Chairperson of the Publicity Wing Committee of the ruling party.

Coming back to the party manifesto, although it is still in the draft stage, senior leaders hint that the SDF poll-plank will be its track-record on delivering development and good governance to the people in the past ten years. Emotive issues like social engineering of caste and

GANGTOK: "The upcoming polls will obviously be a

two-way fight between SDF and Congress, but the result will definitely be one-way in favour of Sikkim Democratic Front," believes a confident political advisor to the CM and former CM himself, BB Gooroong.

Mr. Gooroong points out that the people are tired of political parties which surface only when elections are round the corner.

"SDF has remained in consistent touch with the people throughout its two terms. We don't have leaders who forget the people when elections are over. By that logic, we never really stopped campaigning. Now, the party president has further revamped all the frontal organisations of the party and everyone is prepared. We always were," Mr. Gooroong contends.

Stressing another factor he sees as the SDF's strength and Opposition's weakness, Mr. Gooroong points out that SDF is "cadre-based" party while the Congress is in disarray.

"Our party workers and supporters have always remained with us. We go down to the grassroots while the Congress makes only a superficial show of comeback every time there are election. At present, they are also in disarray with the their composition confusing not only the people, but also the party-members. The Sangrami-


Congressi factor is disorienting everyone," he says.

"At present, Mr. Bhandari does not even have a safe constituency for himself. How does he expect to lead an entire party to victory?" he quips.

He further maintains that the Opposition has neither issues at hand nor promises to make. "In fact, they are taking the existing schemes of the government and just adding to them. They are that bankrupt for ideas," he said.

When asked to comment on SDF's gameplan, he says that they will go to polls with issues of development and good governance.

"We have a good a track-record on both counts and it will not take much convincing. We don't want to get into emotive issues. Our ten years in power reflect our commitment to such issues. We will let our performance speak for itself. The bhagidari [participatory] form of governance that we practice with more power at the grassroots will also work to our benefit." he adds.

Area MLA, Lachen-Mangshila and Minister for Power, Hissey Lachungpa, Minister for Tourism and Land Revenue, KT Gyalsten, MLA [Dzongu], Sonam Gyatso Lepcha, Deputy Speaker, Palden Lachungpa, Rajya Sabha MP, PT Gyamtso, District Collector, North, secretaries and senior officials of various government departments and local Panchayats represented the state administration at the Janata Mela

The Chief Minister made a token distribution of various schemes under Rural Housing. Chief Minister's Self-Employment Scheme, LPG connection, Old Age pensions, etc to the beneficiaries. He also handed over a scholarship certificate and award to Rinkila Bhutia, a student of Mangan Senior Secondary School for winning the first prize in an essay competition and also making it to the merit list of the Class X examinations in the State.

And then, it was time for politics. Addressing a huge gathering

at the Public Ground here. Mr. Chamling said that the Janata Mela, launched by the SDF government two years ago with the sole intentions of providing benefits "directly" to the people at the grassroots, has been a big success.

He refuted allegations made by the Opposition parties that the various schemes launched by the SDF government were populists in nature by saying that the Opposition parties were hardly aware of the difference between terms such as 'grants, loans and benefits."

The Opposition leaders are involved in spreading rumours and misguiding the people of the State on the various welfare schemes launched by my government directly for the people. The previous government under Nar Bahadur Bhandari came nowhere close to providing such benefits to the people. That our efforts have directly benefited the people is evident for all to see," he said.

Mr. Chamling said that the opposition leaders should remember that it was his government that managed to achieve OBC status for the left out communities in the State.

"During his tenure when the Mandal Commission was formed and the demand to include the Chettri, Bahun and Newar communities was raised, Mr. Bhandari opposed the inclusion. It was only after the SDF came to power that the matter was again pursued and achieved. We were also successful in achieving tribal status to the Limbu and Tamang communities," he said.

The Chief Minister also asked the people not be get swayed by the false promises and rumours spread by the Opposition parties.

On the issue of the seats reserved for the Bhutia-Lepchas in the State Assembly, the Chief Minister said that he has been consistently reiterating that the BL seats were safe, even after the inclusion of Limbu-Tamang in the Scheduled Tribes list.

Mr. Chamling then spelt out the various people-centric policies and programmes of the SDF government and his vision to make Sikkim a model State by 2015 - free of poverty and complete in literacy.

Given the scale at which the Janata Melas have been launched and perhaps because there is still some red tape involved in shortlisting the beneficiaries, some potential beneficiaries approached NOW! with the complaint that their "panchayat" has repeatedly duped them into submitting detailed records and documents, but never getting them included in the list of beneficiaries. Some had already received the first instalment of benefits, but were being made to run from pillar to post by the panchavats to receive the second instalment, they alleged.

SHRP makes its SDF-hating ways clear in Mangan

MANGAN: The Sikkim Himali Rajya Parishad party [SHRP] kicked off its election campaign in North Sikkim at a public meeting held here on January 16.

SHRP president Dr. AD Subba led the meeting here at the Old Bazar, which was also attended by the party's North District president, Peter Lepcha and other prominent members of the party.

Addressing the gathering, Mr. Lepcha gave his reasons for joining the party, which he said was "democratic" and "committed" to welfare of the people. He said that the SHRP was the only party where the distinction between the rich and the poor was nil and therefore, it understood the problems of the poor people.

"Being a retired Revenue Of-

ficer, I decided to support Dr. Subba's party because I am convinced that this party can do a lot for the underprivileged people of the State," he said.

Criticising the ruling SDF government's Janata Mela and the welfare schemes, Mr. Lepcha said that these welfare schemes were actually central schemes just being distributed by the State government. He said that the SDF was misleading the innocent people of the State by claiming the schemes to be theirs

Various senior members of the party also addressed the crowd, and all preferred to criticise the ruling SDF government. They blamed the SDF government for the rising crimes in the State, saying that murders and rapes were occurring almost on a daily basis. They all expressed their concerns over the safety of the people in

the State and criticised the administration for failing to check the rising crimes in the State.

The various speakers also spoke at length about the unemployment problem in Sikkim, the drug problem and increasing mental illnesses and suicides. They all said that the SDF government had failed to fulfil the aspirations of the people of the State.

Dr. Subba, in his address, said that the main reason behind the formation of the party was to work for the welfare of the people and fight corruption in the State. Echoing the same anti-SDF sentiments as his fellow party members, Dr. Subba said that the benefits are only reaching those people who are a members of the SDF party and have put up an SDF flag on their houses. He said that most of the Central grants are being "misused" by politicians and bureaucrats.

On the issue of voters' identity cards, the Department recently launched its second round of issuing photo IDs. "From January 12 this year, we have relaunched the photo identity cards programme in all the four districts of the State. This is mainly for those who were left out during the first round held last year. Also, those voters who have lost their cards can get new ones made during this round, along with those newly enrolled in the voters list and those who have attained 18 years of age for these polls," Mr. Dhakal said.

The Department is confident that the entire process of issuing photo identity cards would be over by the end of February.

"We have already completed about 76 percent of the process and hope to achieve 100 percent target by the end of February," Mr. Dhakal said.

This year's polls will also see electronic voting machines being used for the first time in the State. The Central Election Commission has already directed the Depart-

ment on the compulsory use of EVMs during the polls.

The elections don't come cheap either. Simultaneous polls will tote up a bill of not less than Rs. 1.5 crores in organising. This is just what the State will spend. What the parties invest will be completely different set of economics.

In fact, the Opposition leader Nar Bahadur Bhandari is already making public declarations that the upcoming polls will be a contest between "dhan-shakti and jan-shakti." He would obviously have us believe that the money is with the ruling SDF and the people with him and Congress [I]. Expensive elections will not be new to Sikkim. The 1999 polls saw every side pump in a lot into the campaigning. It will not be much different this time around.

What is however clear is that the polls will be a two-way contest between the Bhandari led Cong [I] and Mr. Chamling's SDF. The equations were only a little different last time around. Although Congress was in the contest, as the final tally showed [Congress bagged barely 4 per cent vote-share], the fight was always between SSP and SDF in the people's minds. And, since politics

and parties in Sikkim are so personality driven, this time again, it will be a face-off between Mr. Chamling and Mr. Bhandari.

There will be of course the usual round of defectors from one party to the other, when the tickets are decided. But that is a giveaway of a "leaders" lack of votebase. If strong enough to win, why wouldn't the parent-party have given him a ticket instead. Elections are after all about winning. They at best play the role of spoil-sports, splitting some votes away.

As things stand, Mr. Chamling by virtue of being in power and having had a decent two terms holds the upper hand. Mr. Bhandari, on the other hand, will have to first convince the people on the reasons why he joined a national party that he had whipped so often from public platforms in the past. He has also been a rather reticent Opposition leader throughout the present term and Mr. Chamling's constant reminders that only SDF remained with the people throughout while "others" surfaced only when elections came about, will be a difficult argument to downplay. Specially so because Congress in Sikkim has traditionally been a party which activates itself when elections are round the corner.

Also the fact that Congress is not yet riding an anti-SDF wave will make a bid at its power difficult. SDF, in 1994, when it rode the strongest wave since the seventies, it made it power barely by the skin of its teeth. Ditto for Mr. Bhandari back in 1979 when he had managed to catch the mass imagination.

But then democracy has matured much even since 1994 and the voting preferences are something that not even the most "scientific" of psephology cannot predict accurately. What is certain is that Sikkim is going for simultaneous polls in April; that it is going to be a two-way contest; expensive; and, if Congress is convinced of its chances, also violent.

- We appeal to all our consumers to take the following actions to help the department to maintain regular power supply.

- 1. Do not use heaters, geysers, electric irons and other electrical gadgets during the peak hours i.e. 17.00 hrs to 21.00 hrs.
- 2. Switch off the lights, which are not necessary.
- 3. Replace your bulbs with compact fluoroscent lamps
- 4. Do not use compound with lights and flood lights.

Use of electric welding sets, industrial loads, motor of any kind is restricted from 06.00 hours to 09.00 hours and 17.00 hrs to 21.00 hrs till further notice. If anybody is found using electricity for such purposes the service connection will be disconnected and heavy fine will be imposed

GANGTOK: The Sikkim Post Graduate Association, on Tuesday, 20 January, launched a state wide peaceful agitation to express its dissatisfaction over the existing policies of the government, particularly on education and unemployment and also to impress upon the youth the need to be aware and self-sufficient at all times.

"We will reach our message to every nook and corner of the state, this will hopefully make our youth become aware of their untapped potential," say members of SPGA.

This was decided at an executive body meeting held at Sikkim Employees Guest House a day earlier.

The SPGA General Secretary, Padam Bahadur Chettri, who pre-

sided over the meeting expressed the disappointment of SPGA over the non-inclusion of the locals in various posts of lecturers in the State Government College in the year 2001 and said that non-Sikkimese people should be only appointed when "suitable and qualified" local people are not available in the state as per the rules of Article 371, which gives the state special concessions.

He has also filed a writ petition about this in the High Court, with regard to non implementation of the rule which guarantees this right.

SPGA, which was formed last year, has been continuing its fight over what they see as an unfair policy of the state government.


The association has been emphatic over the cancellation of the controversial list for the appointment of lecturers prepared by the State Public Service Commission. The list, the association says, goes completely against the protection of the public interest in the state government employment and disregarded a number of deserving local candidates. They subse-

quently pressurized the Department of Education and the SPSC to cancel the controversial appointment of lecturers.

The meeting emphasized on the need to create a state employment exchange for recruiting candidates. They have also demanded for State Level Eligibility Test [SLET], the setting up of a State Council of Educational Research and Training, and state cadre for assistant lecturers

It will be interesting to see how far the SPGA's talk and walk takes them this time.



this most people would know, what they might not be aware of is that the traffic police raised Rs. 40 lakhs in fines during this period. This diligence of my staff has now resulted in more disciplined traffic on the streets. I have always believed that the police has a role to play in developing a sense of discipline and duty among the people and it is to this end that even the strictest of rules were enforced. Now the realization has seeped in and strict enforcement is no longer required.

In the field of law and order, my colleagues and juniors have proven to be very efficient and effective. There were no major problems on these fronts in the past four years. All heinous crimes were solved in record time and the accused nabbed. "Spiderman" was the only one who got away during my tenure, but now, even he is behind bars. The civil situation never went out of hand. The panchayat elections were completed smoothly and there was always a semblance of law and order.



SHEHAR MEIN KAALA!

The Kaala, on its part, after some disinterested looks at the crowd that had collected under the building, decided it was time for its Saturday nap. It slept through the several pebbles thrown, perhaps warmed by the heat from the sub-baked concrete slab.


And, the Forest Deptt. trappers never turned up. Perhaps they knew only too well that the animal is harmless and essentially a herbivore with a weakness for large cardamom and



an occasional taste for small birds and eggs. Its surfacing in Gangtok is not even rare. A common visitor to areas like Forest Colony and Burtuk, a Kaala was also trapped in the Power Department office some years back. At that time, it caused a near stampede in the corridors of power when it strolled through.

They are not shy animals so they don't normally run away when they see people and many mistake this attitude for aggressiveness and panic. Needless to add, the forests and cardamom fields are the usual foraging grounds for the Civet Cats. They go urban only when their natural habitat starts shrinking. The Himalayan Bear that terrorised SITCO some years back being a case in point.

A wildlife expert from the State, when asked whether the animal was dangerous, said: "Not at all. In fact the only dangerous animal is man."

Lack of public initiative scuttles drive to keep jhoras clean

he joint jhora-cleaning op eration launched by the State Pollution Control Board and UD&HD is almost complete. According to the departments, 9 jhoras in and around Gangtok were cleaned by UD&HD labourers in the last month and a half since the 'Abatement of Pollution' campaign was launched.

But things seem to be back where they started. There is no perceptible difference as the residents continue to dump garbage directly into the ihoras with impunity. Although the concerned departments had made it clear to the local residents that this cleaning drive would be a one time initiative, with the responsibility thereon being of the local people of the area, the message, it seems, has not got through.

The centrally sponsored scheme, the first of its kind in the country is aimed at catalyzing improved civic sense among the Gangtokians but the people remain unconvinced that they must share the responsibility for keep ing their own area clean

Minister UD&HD, TT Bhutia, in his speech on 30 November at Bishal Gaon, when the drive was launched had urged the local residents to form committees to ensure the general cleanliness of their neighborhoods, "This is your problem and the solution should be initiated by you. We can of course facilitate the process", he had said.

But till now no committees have been formed as advised by the department. No one has yet come forward to take the initiative.

According to Dr. Gopal Pradhan, Senior Scientist, SPCB, most of Gangtok's daily generation of 27,500 kgs of garbage is dumped directly dumped into the jhoras. The damage this un-





healthy practice does to the environment is drastic and its time for the people to start doing their bit.

"The concerned departments have already done their duty, they have also given special initiatives like the cleanest jhora award to the most responsible locality, but it does not seem to be working,

"There's no point blaming us for everything. The departments are doing so much but there is no feed back from the people, although the work is for their benefit, there is no appreciation and

The Sikkim Polution Control Board and UDHD initiative at work. A total of nine jhoras were cleaned in the rajdhani in the hope that the local residents would take care not to "pollute" them again. It remains a hope.

no participation from them," he complains further.

The SPCB and UD&HD have taken the initiative to keep the ihoras clean, now it is up to the local residents to come forward. Local NGOs, Panchayats, elders and youth should take part in making this drive work. The Departments will welcome suggestions and views from the people and say they are ready to cooperate in any way.

But Tshering Nima would have none of it. She had struggled all her life and she would not suffer these upstarts to tell her what to do. So she religiously got up at five every morn-

ing to visit the beef stalls to fetch her daily quota of oxtail bones, lungs and a general assortment of other bovine appendages from which she could conjure up a tasty side dish for Nabin Limbu and company.

Nabin loved the spongy lung curry that went down so well with Hit beer. Tshering Nima had a little secret up her sleeve as far as the beef lung was concerned. The dish that she prepared was like no other and Nabin Limbu and his friends would feel a nagging incompleteness in their lives if they stayed away from it for more than three days. The lung curry did not cost much and was perfect for the conscience - whatever guilt they felt in squandering their money on beer and chaang was considerably allayed by the protein-rich nourishment that they imbibed from Tshering Nima's delectable lung fries.

Amala seemed a little surprised to see Nabin at 10 in the morning but she kept it to herself and instead asked him what he wanted. Nabin told her that he needed the usual and then sat on the wooden bench quietly contemplating the prayer wheel that rotated in the thermals provided by the butter lamp that flickered obsequiously before the scarfed idol of Buddha. He could sense that he was alone and this realisation made him jealous of all the lucky folks at the government offices - folks, who would be at this very juncture, pushing files, typing letters, sipping tea and engaging in sundry other useful acts that would guarantee them the reassuring comfort of a salary at the end of every month. It was too bad that in the greater scheme of things he was out of this loop of welfare and would remain so if he kept failing in these little exams that were meant to test whether he was good enough to teach something, anything, to kids of class one or lower.

The more he thought about it the lesser sense it made and he had almost reached the breaking point of this cognitive endeavour when salvation arrived in a bottle of Hit beer and a plate full of lung fry. He took a sip of the beer and then nibbled stingily at a tiny morsel of the fry. It tasted just divine and he then realised just what he had been missing. All that negative emotion began to simply melt away. He was once again filled to the brim with a brave confidence that all was not lost and that his time would yet come





DARJ GIRL BREAKS KOLLYWOOD ICE

Niruta "Darpan Chaaya" Singh bags best actress award

iruta Singh, of Darjeeling, has been recognized as the best actress in the Nepalese film industry.

She was honored at the largest Nepali film awards ceremony ever, organized by Dabur Nepal and TV channel Nepal One last Saturday in Kathmandu.

At a five-hour extravaganza, the Dabur Anmol awards were given away for the first time to honor excellence and achievements in the 52-year-old Nepalese film industry.

The programme, attended by Nalini Singh who heads Nepal One, had a strong Indian presence.

"Lahana", directed by Tulsi Ghimire who hails from Kalimpong was nominated for most of the 26 categories, ranging from best costume to best film and best actor. However, though Ghimire bagged the award for best editing, and "Lahana's" lead pair was selected for the best actress and actor awards, the best film and best director tributes eluded him.

Readers will recall the grand premier of 'Lahana' in Gangtok in August 2002, which had Niruta Singh and Dilip Raimajhi, along with Director, Tulsi Ghimere in attendance.

The presence of local boys
Uttam Pradhan from Singtam
along with Karma Loday from
Baluwakhani and Bikash
Chamling, son of the Chief
Minister drew huge crowds
here.

The film had also been extensively shot in Sikkim. In effect, the Nepali film awards had more connections to Sikkim than just the organiser, Channel One, Nalini Singh's more successful venture since the botched TV-Live experimented in Sikkim.

At the awards, Nepalese actor Dilip Raimajhi, the Shah Rukh Khan of Nepal, pipped Rajesh Hamal, the Amitabh Bachchan of Nepal, for the best actor award, and music director Sachin Singh picked up the trophy for best background score.

Niruta had the joy of being chosen the best actress after having lost the place earlier. Last year, she had lost to popular star Jal Shah, who won the Lux Film Awards. Despite the roaring success of Darpan Chaava and Lahana, Niruta has had a rather rough run as far as acceptance in Kollywood [as the Nepali film industry is referred to]. The industry, for example, has awarded on Ugen Chophel of Sikkim for contribution towards the Nepali film industry. Tulsi Ghimire has been routinely ignored for any major award thus far.

Niruta Singh, who scaled new heights of success with her earlier film "Darpan Chaaya" had said in an interview to NOW! that she was overwhelmed by the response from the people of Sikkim

to her performance in both 'Darpan Chaaya' and 'Lahana'.

Ghimire's film also enabled Bollywood-based singer Udit Narayan to win the award for best male playback singer. In the singer's absence, the trophy was collected by his wife.

Besides Ghimire's film, director Bijaya Chalise's Sholay-like thriller "Muktidata" was the other major contender, sweeping many of the other awards.

"Muktidata" had hit the headlines last year when it was shot in the Tibetan area of Mustang, setting a record for being shot in one of the highest altitude locations.

Besides bringing the whiff of a unique way of life and culture, "Muktidata" was also unusual because of the confession by its producer Rajendra Thakuri, who also owns a tourist agency, that the film was made to boost visitors to Mustang.

Dabur Nepal established itself in the cultural calendar of Nepal by becoming the sponsor of the Miss Nepal pageant.

he most perfect thing about Kalimpong is its weather. This is not what you can say for Darjeeling where it becomes a kind of a necessity to invent poetic excuses for the inconsistency of the weather gods. For the students the winter is a vacuum that can be filled by any kind of growth. So while an entire generation once wasted its winter with catapults chasing after elusive bulbuls the present lot much more street-smart and cocky would rather haunt the NIIT or the APTECH.

Winter in Kalimpong is that twilight season where, allegorically speaking, one is caught between the coldness of colonial Darjeeling and the pretentious heat of a hasty, all-selling Siliguri. Kalimpong is warm. It's not just the warmth of temperature. It's that human warmth of closeness that comes in doing things together - of sitting beside the fires and swapping tales, of going for tuitions, of just playing out in the streets to test out the truth of that old adage that the "cold of the young are nibbled way by the goats"

It's also the bright botanical warmth of the bougainvillea blossoms and the poinsettia petals that sometimes send their hybrid fingers a little hesitantly into the same balmy blueness that their wild cousins have been piercing with instinctive impunity for aeons.

Bhutan's Royal Monetary Authority issues warning against lady from Sikkim and her get-rich-quick scam

hutan's Royal Monetary Authority [RMA] has is-Sued a notification cautioning Bhutanese public against a get-rich-quick money making scheme, Gold Coin Pyramid, getting popular in Thimphu and Phuentsholing. This scheme could jeopardize personal savings and drain out foreign currency from the country, the RMA has warned reports Bhutan's only English weekly, Kuensel. Apparently it is still unclear who brought the scheme [or scam as RMA would have its people believe] toBhutan, but the weekly reports that "a lady from Sikkim" is marketing it in the Land of Thunder

The pyramid scheme, it is learnt, uses commemorative coins from Gold Ouest International [an international company retailing gold coins based in Hong Kong]. The scheme promises a 13 -gram Bhutanese gold coin for becoming a member and subsequent returns in hard currency. The first investor pays Nu [Bhutanese currency Ngultrum is exchanged at par with the Indian Rupee] 30,000 and gets a gold coin. He or she has to persuade another two people to become members who also pay Nu 30,000 each and get a gold coin in return. In the meantime, the introducer is promised a commission of US\$ 40, which will keep on growing in relation to the number of members in the pyramid.

According to the RMA, the scheme is illegal under the Bhutanese law which bars Bhutanese nationals from engaging in any financial services 'without a license to operate in accordance with the requirements of the Act"

The legality apart, the very fact that the pyramid cannot be sustained for long and that only those at the top of the pyramid can expect to make any money out of the scheme does not seem to have discouraged too many Bhutanese from giving it a shot.

The scheme reportedly sprouted from Chennai and has duplicated the RMA seal of authentication to make it look like a legalized financial business. A very subtle misleading since RMA officials have clarified that the seal was to certify the authentication of gold given to the Gold Quest company in Hong Kong, the authorized coin minter of RMA.

Many countries have banned the Gold Quest pyramid scheme. In Chennai, where the company's India headquarters is based, there are reports of complaints alleging payments ranging from Rs. 16,000 to Rs. 43,000 without any gold coin or cash in return. The pyramid may have run itself out in India, but was just warming up in Bhutan when the RMA dampener came about. It will, however, be interesting to know who the "lady from Sikkim" is and whether she was actually playing out a scam in Bhutan or was herself conned into it

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NATHULA CAN WAIT. INDIAN GOODS SMUGG ITO LHASA THROUGH NEPAL treaty, are going on at rampant rate.

ven as India and China de ◆ bate the hows and whens of trade over Nathula, a large number of Indian brands of rice and other consumer goods, which should legally not be there, find pride of place on display counters all over Lhasa and other cities of Tibet. These goods are not imported from India but

smuggled into China from Nepal, it is learnt.

Interestingly, such activities are going on right under the nose of officials at the Nepal-China Tatopani customs checkpost, despite the fact that the country's trade treaty and treaty on control of unauthorized trade with India bars Nepal from re-exporting finished Chinese goods to India and Indian goods to China. As a visit to a local shop even in Gangtok or shops in Lhasa will prove, no one takes these treaties seriously.

A news report in a Kathmandu weekly quotes Nepal's Consular General at Lhasa, Lila Mani Paudel, as conceding that such activities, which go against the trade

Quoting information culled from the Lhasa commerce mission, the Kathmandu weekly, claims that brands of Indian rice including Lalkila, Nature's Gift Regular, Aarati and Long Grain Premium White Rice, among others are widely seen in the Chinese market.

Interestingly, the Nepali traders in Lhasa deny having any knowledge of how the Indian rice turn to pg 22

Sikkim roads get their first Vitara

a NOW REPORT

GANGTOK: The highest selling Sports Utility Vehicle, or SUV as they are known in short, in the US [and the Americans know their cars], the New Grand Vitara XL 7, made its Sikkim debut on 16 January, last Friday, when Entel Motors, the Maruti Suzuki dealers in the State, handed over a sparkling "Grove Green Pearl metallic" beauty, all waddled in khadas and festive baloons to a beaming local customer.

Priced at just under Rs. 18 lakhs, the new Vitara was launched in India in November last year and Entel now holds the privilege of selling the second such vehicle in the Eastern region. Powered by a 166 bhp engine, Vitara is also the most powerful SUV on Indian

roads. Little wonder then that it is also the flagship vehicle of Maruti Suzuki. It is also the only vehicle in the Maruti Suzuki lineup which is imported as CBUs [Completely Built Units].

Nathula can wait. Indian goods smuggle into Lhasa through Nepal

enters Lhasa via Nepal. The Indian traders, however, openly admit that they smuggle these through Tatopani.

"On one hand, such smuggling is eroding away the market of genuine Nepali exports, as cheaper smuggled goods are displacing expensive Nepali goods, on the other, this has increased fear of developing Nepal as a transit for unauthorized trade between India and Tibet," said Paudel, the weekly reports. Nepali branded rice, for example, is priced at Rs. 115 per kg while similar quality Indian rice prices at Rs. 80 per kg.

Many in Nepal believe that the existence of this smuggling route

is the reason why a large quantity of rice enters Nepal, both through official and unofficial gateways, even during the season when local supply is good and the government imports millions of tonnes equivalent of rice to bridge the national deficit.

However, the cross-border smuggling is not limited to rice alone. Raw leather, various brands of powdered spices of Baba Masala Company, shampoos, soaps, toothpaste and fairness creams of Hindustan Lever, Nestle and other reputed brands of Indian companies too are smuggled through Tatopani for sales in Lhasa, the report alleges.

Although the traders on either side are not complaining, the

Nepal government appears to have taken strong note of the practice. Nepal's Consul General has reportedly contacted concerned Nepal government offices like Ministry of Industry, Commerce and Supplies [MoICS] and Department of Customs in this regard. It may be noted that citing "trans-shipment" of Chinese garlic via Nepali territory, India had imposed a ban on import of all Nepali garlic to India. China, too, fears Nepal can raise similar problems if the issue is not dealt with immediately. This could cost heavy to Nepal considering the fact that it already suffers a trade deficit of Rs 9 billion with the northern neighbour including Rs. 3 billion with Tibet alone.

Medical Officer, recorded that Yaday received the wound while on duty.

After investigation of the body by military doctors, in the presence of witnesses, the body was taken to STNM for the post mortem. During the course of the investigation police officers visited the spot but could not inspect it as it was sealed by the army authorities. The police will now carry on the investigation

from the army.
