Manmohan to be leader of House in RS

NEW DELHI, 05 June: Prime Minister Manmohan Singh will be the Leader of the House in the Rajya Sabha while BJP leader and former Union Minister Jaswant Singh will be the Leader of Opposition.

Since Dr Singh is a member of the Rajya Sabha, his Cabinet colleague Pranab Mukherjee was earlier nominated as 'Leader of the House in Lok Sabha.

As soon as the Upper House met on the first day of the 201st session, Rajya Sabha Chairman Bhairon Singh Shekhawat introduced the Prime Minister to the members even as Dr Singh stood up and acknowledged it with folded hands.

Shekhawat then told the House that Dr Singh would be the Leader of the House, as conveyed to him by Parliamentary Affairs Minister Ghulam Nabi Azad. Jaswant Singh, who is the leader of BJP in the house, would be the Leader of Opposition, he announced.

SINGTAM, 05 June: Singtam has long been grappling with the problem of littered and dirty streets, overflowing garbage dumps and increasing health problems. All of last year UD&HD conducted a series of meetings searching for a permanent solution. But in spite of all the initiatives launched, Singtam continued to live with the problem.

We have been following the Singtam story over the last two years and today, on World Environment Day, we decided to travel to Singtam to see for ourselves the present situation.

But before we look at the present, let us go back a little.

In July last year, acknowledging the seriousness of the problem, UD&HD held an awareness programme on solid waste management here. The meet, which was attended by more than 200 local residents, was organized to discuss

views and ideas about how to keep the Singtam streets free of garbage.

For the first time in Sikkim, a Garbage Disposal Room was set up in Singtam. Residents were encouraged to dump their garbage in the room everyday, which was to be subsequently collected by UD&HD trucks and taken to the disposal sites.

These initiatives of the department had raised the hopes of the residents for a permanent solution. But a few months later when NOW! visited Singtam to see the progress, it was a dejected populace that we encountered. The hopes raised were dashed when after so many months the town continued to grapple with a garbage disposal system that is woefully inadequate and residents could not help but feel let down by UD&HD.

The GDR inaugurated at the July meeting as the first of its kind in the state was yet to dispose any garbage and the 'bell ringing' tradition which was to come to Singtam and the temporary collec-

tion sites at Jubilee Line and Lall Bazaar were still in the same overrun condition as they were before. The July meeting, believe the locals was a waste of time.

When contacted, the depart-

ment offered its own reasons for the delay in addressing Singtam's woes. The GDR could not be used due to technical reasons, they said. However, locals maintained that the

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Hello...

The telecommunications backbone in the region remains weak. Although both Reliance and BSNL make frequent claims of improved services and broadened customer base, the two service providers are falling woefully short of what the area deserves. They are saved only by the fact that people don't have a third option as far as mobile connectivity is concerned and as for land-lines, BSNL has monopolised the service.

While the BSNL authorities had made loud noises about how crores of rupees in outstanding dues had been defaulted by local subscribers, they remain cagey about commenting on their current level of services. Ask them about the future plans and they will have us believe that Sikkim is headed for the information super highway speeding on the network laid out by the BSNL, which, hoardings all along the highway assure us has taken the "oath" for "Sikkim's growth." Save the ones owning numbers which begin "20," the rest of the land-line users are left with dead phones at the whisper of a thunder anywhere in the Sikkim skies. As for Reliance, any attempt at dialling a landline [in Sikkim] or a BSNL mobile meets with the standard excuse of "congestion" in the land-line network. A very convenient way of straddling BSNL with the blame for failed connection. Making a call from a land-line to a Reliance number remains an attempt in which the odds of getting through are stacked higher than cracking the winning combination on the Super Lotto. Both service providers have failed in meeting the first requirement behind their services - communication. They have to remember that people subscribe to their services so that they can remain in touch with others who might not be necessarily connected to the same network. These are not wireless sets that the people have purchased that they should be limited to a particular bandwidth.

It is not necessary that there are some mala fide reasons why the two players are blocking the other out. It could be a genuine technical glitch that they are ironing out at present, but the least that they could have done is inform the subscribers of the problem. Surely, in the barrage of SMS' they unload on to our mobiles everyday, they could have accommodated one that the people could use - an explanation why their networks refuse networking beyond their respective circles. Will this message get through? Unlikely, the network busy sign is already blinking.

Transit of Venus: A rare celestial event

ome 8 June and one will get an opportunity to witness a very rare celestial event. On that day, if weather is friendly, at around 10:45 a.m. we will see a black dot passing across the face of the sun. This kind of event where some object appears to pass across the face of another object is termed as "Transit" in Astronomy. This time around, the object that's going to pass across face of the Sun is identified the second planet of the Solar system: the Venus, and hence the event - Transit of Venus.

As usual, as is the case with any astronomical event, it will be visible only from some selected regions of the world. For this transit, India is one of the best located places, as the entire transit will be visible from all over the country. In Gangtok, the transit will be visible from 10:45 a.m. till 4:52 p.m.

The event is similar to solar eclipse which occurs when the moon comes in between earth and sun. The moon being nearer to the earth, its apparent size is just enough to cover the whole disc of the sun during total solar eclipse. In case of planetary transits, a planet comes in between the earth and the sun; and even though planets are bigger than the moon, due to their larger distances from earth they appear only as small dots on the face of the sun. And, since it needs a special kind of alignment of the planet with the Sun and the

Earth; planetary transit is an extremely rare occasion. In fact, the last transit of Venus was seen on 06 December 1882, 122 years ago. It's interesting to note that any observer who might have seen the transit of 1882 may not be in this world anymore. So, any observer in the world around, be it an Astronomer of NASA or an ordinary lay man in one of the villages of Sikkim, would be viewing the transit of 08 June for the first time.

We are aware, that all members

of the Solar system, the nine planets including stray comets and dangerous life threatening asteroids, go around the sun in their own orbits. While doing so, the two planets, Mercury and Venus besides our moon can sometimes come in between earth and the sun, the so called position of inferior conjunction. And, being in this position is when there is a possibility of seeing transit of the object. The moon comes to this position every 29th day, that's how we have new moon day and has been the basis of lunar calendar

In the case of the planet Venus, the period is slightly longer of 19 months. That means, every 19th month, Venus comes in between sun and the earth. But then the interesting fact is we do not get opportunity of seeing Transit of Venus every nineteenth month. The reason is very simple; the orbits of earth and Venus are not in the same plane. They are tilted to each other by an angle of 3.4 degree. This tilting is the only reason for having this event so rarely. And, it's the same reason why we do not have every 29th day a solar eclipse even though the moon comes in between earth and the sun on that day. The

orbit of the moon is also tilted from orbit of the earth. So, to have a transit or a solar eclipse, the planet or the moon respectively, needs to be not only between the sun and the earth but they should also lie in the same straight line. And, these conditions of having the object in between and also in the same straight

tween and also in the same straight line are fulfilled very rarely. In fact, after the discovery of telescope by Galelio in 17th century, till now only six transits of Venus have been observed.

It's interesting to note that whenever transit of Venus occurs, it occurs in pairs with a gap of eight years and each alternative pair comes in a gap of 122 years and 105 years. Apart from the transit of 08 June, the next transit of Venus would be visible in June 2012, which, however, will only be partially visible from India as on that day the transit would start much earlier than the time of sun rise in India.



near his table with a volume by Jack London in his hand.

Early next morning I was shocked to find him still sitting in the same place, but panting heavily and in some horrible distress. He lifted his head at the noise of the creaking door. "I am sorry to call you, Twan," he murmured. "I cannot move my leg, Twan. Something has gone wrong

with it." His despairing look meant that he could not do without my help. "Twan, help me to the bed," he said as I rushed to help him, my entire body trembling in one terrified emotion.

"Is it paralysed, master, or is it

rheumatic pain?" I asked. "Looks like that," he replied, taking a deep breath

Slowly, and with great difficulties, I brought him to the bed, while he staggered and held my shoulder with his left hand, the other dangling by his side. NO FOUL-PLAY IN DISCONTINUED PASSENGER TICKET LOTTERY SCHEME, CLAIMS SNT

GANGTOK, 05 June: Sikkim Nationalised Transport officials today objected strongly against news reports indicting it of foul play in the conduction of the Passenger Lottery Ticket scheme initiated by it. Incidentally, the scheme which began on October, 2000 was terminated in April this year.

The Additional Secretary RB Gurung, while speaking to NOW!, clarified that there was no question of any mischief involved in the lottery scheme.

"The lottery was started as a scheme to increase the revenue of the department by enticing more people to travel in its buses. The results which were declared monthly were published in both, the English and Nepali local newspapers. Besides this, they were also prominently displayed in all our buses and depots here as well as in Kalimpong and Siliguri," he says.

The passenger ticket lottery was drawn every month and had three cash prizes of Rs. 15,000, Rs. 10,000 and Rs. 5000. Tickets were collected by the 15th of the month and the winners were picked in a public draw supervised by a lottery committee.

"Often we had children and tourists picking the winners from the rotating drum," informs the Addl. Secv.

The winners approached the SNT offices to claim their prize money and had to produce the winning ticket along with their photograph.

"The prize money was given only when the winners approached us. Most of the times there were no claimants for the prizes; in such cases the money remained in the government treasury," Mr. Gurung reveals.

He further reveals that the prizemoney was never kept with the department but was with the government. "So, there is no question of any of our officers involved in any underhand dealings," he feels.

The Passenger Lottery Scheme proved to be a failure since it trigerred no enhancement in the revenue of the Transport Department.

Therefore, to curtail our expenditure on the lottery, with the approval of the government, we discontinued it from April," reveals Mr. Gurung. The last draw took place on 23 April, 2004. The monthly expenditure on the lottery incurred by the Transport Department came to about Rs. 34,000.

He attributes the failure of the scheme to ineffective publicity as well as to the competition provided by the light motor vehicles.

"People prefer to use the taxi jeeps as there are comfortable and faster," feels Mr. Gurung.

16 imprisoned for three to five years in

CHUKHA, Bhutan, 05 June: The 16 men involved in the election bribery case in Chukha - two councillor candidates, 12 DYT members, and two other accomplices were sentenced by the Chukha Dzongkhag court yesterday to prison terms ranging from three to five years. The money used in the bribery was forfeited.

Candidate Karma Dorji, who

first revealed the bribery issue, received five years in prison, Mangmi of Lokchina Geog, Janga Bir Ghalley three and a half years for trying to mislead the Court, and the rest were given three years each.

The court described their action "immoral, unethical, and criminal acts of bribery and corruption" that threatened the "rule of law, undermined social justice and good governance", deviated from the "principles of free and fair election", and "endangered the stability of political institutions and moral foundations of society"

"The institution of public office and those who contest require undoubted integrity and public confidence," said Drangpon Lungten Dubgyur. "By selling themselves they have violated the law of the land and, more so, breached the trust, faith, and confidence vested in them by society."

Eight of 11 geogs in Chukha dzongkhag will re-elect their local leaders following the verdict that was passed by the Chukha district court yesterday afternoon. Bongo, Dungna and Jabchok were not affected.

The gup of Tala, Aita Singh Aley, mangmi Nima Gyeltshen, chimi Lokman Rai, Geling's mangmi Dorji, Getana's chimi, Tashi Dorji, Metakha gup Trelu, and the mangmi of Phuentsholing, Ram Prasad Rai, were sentenced to three years each for accepting bribes of Nu 5.000 each from Karma Dorii, a businessman in Tsimalakha who stood for the elections.

wheelbarrows problem in negotiating the steps to the GDR was not a serious enough technical problem. They also wanted UD&HD trucks to lift garbage everyday, as against the alternate day routine. The department had then lobbed the ball back to the people's court by claiming that no local body came up with suggestions on how to tackle Singtam's garbage disposal problem.

The problem continued to fester and this time we went to Singtam looking for the Big Garbage Story. We did not find that, but what we found was even more interesting. The people of Singtam

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have come up with their own solution to keep their neighbourhood free of the stink and dirt of uncollected garbage.

The locals have started their own community service by forming a local committee to look into the seriousness of their garbage disposal problem.

"In spite of continued interaction with UD&HD, we could find no solution, this time we decided to take matters in our own hand' said an area resident.

Under the guidance of Dhiren Lama, OC, Singtam Police Station, this committee approached local truck owners to provide the community with trucks every day to dispose garbage. The trucks have now started coming everyday and with the help of Safai Karamcharis, all the garbage is taken to Goshkan Dara, a temporary disposal site, ensuring that the town stays clean and livable.

"We are very happy with this provision as we did not know that the solution to our problem lay with ourselves," say the community workers, happy that Singtam has found a solution for its garbage disposal problem.

The Safai Karamcharis are being provided monetary help, which is also arranged by the committee and locals.

Meanwhile the ambitious initiative taken by UD&HD in the form of the Garbage Disposal Room continues to be unutilised. According to the locals it stays locked all the time and is being used as a store room.

Pope scolds Bush over 'deplorable events' in Iraq

ope John Paul chided Presi dent Bush yesterday for the "deplorable events" in Iraq and urged him to quickly restore Iraq's sovereignty.

The visit to the Vatican was one of Bush's first stops in a European iaunt that the White House hoped would embellish the President's standing as a world leader.

But as the Pope has done in the past, he spoke his mind freely and scolded the American leader.

Speaking with difficulty and at times slurring his words, the Pope condemned the "deplorable events" of recent weeks "which have troubled the civic and religious conscience of all." It was believed to be a reference to the abuse of Iraqis in the Abu Ghraib prison.

Without a commitment to "share human values ... neither war nor terrorism will ever be over-

Seated next to the pontiff, Bush promised that his nation would work for "human liberty and human dignity." He also awarded the Pope the US Medal of Freedom.

Outside the Vatican, tens of thousands of Italians protested Bush's visit and called for the removal of Italian troops from Iraq.

Italian Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi, a strong supporter of Bush's Iraq policy, called the protests a "flop." Bush is also slated to meet he French President Jacques Chirac and take part tomorrow in a ceremony honoring the 60th anniversary of World War II's D-Day invasion.

Historically, presidential excursions abroad are almost always a political plus - and Bush is counting on a political bump from a steady diet of photo-ops with global movers and shakers during the month.

"There's a tradition that Americans always feel better about their President when he is representing their country abroad," a senior Bush adviser acknowledged.

Bush has three foreign policy extravaganzas in June beginning with this weekend's visit to Italy and France. During a second European visit from June 25-29, Bush will meet with European Union leaders

in Ireland and attend a summit of NATO heads of state in Turkey.

Between those headline-grabbing journeys, he also will host next week's G8 economic summit at Sea Island, Ga., where a new UN resolution on Iraq and Iraqi debt reduction top the presidential agenda.

NEW DELHI, 05 June: Fake stamp paper scam accused Abdul Karim Telgi is suffering from AIDS, CBI sources said today quoting a report of the National Institute of Communicable Diseases.

The sources said the blood sample of Telgi, who was brought to Delhi for questioning, was sent to NICD which confirmed that the scamster was HIV positive.

Telgi was brought to the national capital last month during which he revealed information to the CBI which led to seizure of fake stamps amounting to Rs 1.5 crore in Bangalore.

CBI sources said Telgi was aware that he was carrying the deadly disease.

PROBE LIKELY INTO FOREIGN

NEW DELHI, 05 June: Caught unawares by media reports about the publication of International Herald Tribune in India, the government decided to seek an explanation from the publishers even as the latter said the permission had been duly taken from the Registrar of Newspapers in India (RNI).

Information and Broadcasting Ministry sources revealed that the publication of the newspaper from Hyderabad was a 'complete violation' of existing guidelines, and said an internal inquiry would be conducted to find out how the RNI gave the title clearance without informing the Ministry.

Information and Broadcasting Minister S Jaipal Reddy held a series of meetings throughout the day, and it was felt that the government had ample evidence to take action against the publishers, Midram Publication Private Limited. The

Ministry is also seeking legal opin-

ion in this regard.

Media reports said the newspaper was being printed and published since the last week by T Venkatram Reddy who is also the owner and publisher of Hyderabad-based English daily Deccan Chronicle.

The International Herald Tribune is part of The New York Times Group, and the editor of the Indian edition is M J Akbar.

estled at an elevation of 3200 metres above sea level, with Yuksom towards the south and Dzongri further north, Tsokha becomes a bustling hamlet during the tourist season. This village with seasonal occupancy serves as an acclimatization point for trekkers bound for Dzongri, Goechala and beyond.

Tourist season comes twice a year, between March to May and September to November. During these times this village of ten families metamorphoses into candle-lit cafeterias, cabins for rent and big barns for pack animals. With the nearest shops and establishments an eight-hour rigorous trek away at Yuksom [14 kms below], business is brisk and guests welcome.

Tourists come. They climb. They go back. And the rest of the six months reflect a not so colourful life of the residents of Tsokha. Every family owns a substantial amount of livestock [sheep, horses and Dzos] engaged in the tourism business besides which there is no

real money coming in.

During the winters, all of Tsokha, cattle and their owners, migrates down to Yuksom to escape the harsh cold and snow. There is no vegetation for the cattle and no tourists to cater to for the masters. With a lifestyle devoid of electricity and a settlement about a day's rek from Yuksom, most of the children of Tsokha obtain their education in boarding schools elsewhere.

Monsoons bring in their own share of woes for the residents. Trails become treacherous, everyday chores stretch longer and worst of all, their animals fall sick.

With no veterinarians around, the animals have to depend on indigenous knowledge for treatment. Herbs for diseases and kerosene for injuries and fractures, informs a local. The vet down at Yuksom is firstly too far, and secondly 'of little use since his knowledge does not streeth to the requirements of the mountain animals, says another cattle owner.

"Our local medicines work better, they have nothing there anyway," she adds.

And in case of human ailments, help is about a day's pony or porter ride away at the Health Centre at Yuksom. More serious problems require a jeep ride on to Geyzing and still further to Gangtok if the condition does not improve.

"I guess it does not make sense to have a clinic where there are no roads and no electricity and accessible only nine months a year," remarks *Bhauju* who runs a trekkers' hut

LOS ANGELES: The estranged husband of actress Halle Berry, R&B singer Eric Benet, is challenging their prenuptial agreement in court as he seeks spousal support from his Oscar-winning wife

Benet filed papers this week in Los Angeles Superior Court asking a judge to "determine the validity and/or enforceability of the parties? prenuptial agreement and subsequent amendments thereto," according to documents posted on the Web site thesmokinggun.com.

The documents show Benet is asking Berry to pay his legal bills and spousal support but does not know the "nature and extent" of their joint assets and debts.

Berry, 37, who won the Acad-



emy Award as best actress for her sexually charged performance in "Monster's Ball," filed for divorce from Benet, 33, her second husband, in April of this year, six months after the couple separated.

The divorce petition cited irreconcilable differences as the reason for the split. In a recent appearance on Oprah Winfrey's TV show, Berry said Benet had been unfaithful to her and was being treated for sexual addiction

The two married in January 2001 and have no children. Berry's previous marriage to Cleveland Indians outfielder David Justice ended in divorce in 1996.

Berry, last in theaters starring in the psychological thriller "Gothika," will next be seen in the title role of "Catwoman," due for release in July.

FINDERS KEEPERS? MAN SUED AFTER \$50,000 FIND

BUENOS AIRES: A jobless Argentine who found \$50,000 buried in trash and promptly bought a house, two cars and a corner shop is now being sued by a woman claiming her maid mistakenly had thrown out the cash.

"All I can say is that I am no criminal," Paulo Altamirano, a 46vear-old man who ekes out a living by collecting street garbage in the central city of Cordoba, was quoted as saying on Thursday by local DyN news agency.

Emilia Mascoy, a 70-year-old store owner, brought a lawsuit for fraud and demanded her money be returned. She says a maid mistakenly threw out the box of cash during a spring cleaning at her home, DyN reported.

A massive economic crisis in 2002 forced thousands of Argentines known as "cartoneros" to earn their living by collecting and then selling street garbage such as cardboard.

BAN STIRS CONTROVERSY SHORT SKIRT

MOSCOW: A Russian regional government has told its women employees to stop wearing short skirts and tone down their makeup because they were arousing their male colleagues' "animal instincts."

The ruling by Oleg Shlyk,

deputy governor of Kaliningrad on Russia's Baltic coast, has stirred indignation among many in the enclave - including its menfolk.

"Of course, a woman must attract a man's attention, but not so much as to overstep norms and arouse not business-like but only animal instincts," Shlyk told the NTV television network.

An NTV commentator said Shlyk's ruling meant that women in Kaliningrad administration headquarters would have to forsake short skirts in favor of businesssuits, shun outlandish jewelry and wear only modest make-up.

Yuri Matochkin, a deputy in the regional parliament, indignantly said the ruling brought shame on Shlyk himself.
