



More Himalayan Mountaineering Correspondence Bob Gould

In our catalog, Singer and I included most of the chapter "A Tale of Philately" from the book Tales of the Himalaya: Adventures of a Naturalist by Lawrence W. Swan. Swan told about the trials and tribulations that he endured in order to mail covers for the 1954 California Himalayan Expedition to Makalu. The covers were made from native Nepalese Daphne paper and had in the upper left corner a cinderella label designed by Swan for this expedition. These were printed in red, blue and green and over 1000 covers were mailed out with both Nepalese and Indian stamps and cancels. The covers had a black R/S "CARRIED BY RUNNER" and another "BARUN GLACIER BASE CAMP". A 1954 newspaper article states that "Each cover will cost \$1 and will be addressed directly to the person ordering. Five hundred of the labels are reserved for the personal use of the expedition's members and 500 have been set aside for the use of the

public". One of the covers that I own included a short note (on Daphne paper) to Bob, signed Bill. The cover was addressed to an individual at Stead AFB in Reno, NV and had no return address or sender's name. I thought it would be interesting to try and discover who had mailed this particular cover. The expedition took place 50 years ago and had three members named William and one named Willie, so I had my work cut out for me. After corresponding with several different members I was able to narrow it down to William Long who now lives in Alaska and subsequently signed the cover for me. We have had several phone conversations and he was most helpful in supplying me with additional information about this and other mountaineering expeditions. In fact, hw was also a member of the first expedition to climb the highest peak in Antarctica, Mount Vinson in 1966.



Double Sealed Document by Dick van der Wateren

A few years ago, I obtained an interesting double sealed document with the seal of Jung Bahadur Rana and his younger brother Bam Bahadur. The translation of the text is as follows:

Big seal: Prime Minister Jung Bahadur Rana

Small seal: Commander-in-Chief Bam Bahadur Rana

Date: BS 1909 Baisakh 4, Saturday (ca. 16 April 1853 AD)

This document is an order to the *Bichari* of Pokhara Court, Mr. Gopi Nath Upadhyay.

<u>Background:</u> During those times, certain local people were assigned the duty of *Hulaki* (postman) for a certain region. For their salary they were given a plot of land to cultivate. After the designated *Hulaki* died, his son would take over the job and continue using the land.

Gist of the case: In this case, the Post Office at Tanahun Alsi Chilaune (a place near Pokhara) was being run by Mr. Prajapati Padyay (*Hulaki*). When he died without any children, his wife

continued to use the plot instead of handing it to Mr. Sekhar Padyay who was appointed Hulaki in Mr. Prajapati's place. Mr. Sekhar, the new Hulaki, was given another plot to cultivate. But he could not use that plot either, because the Mohi of the land refused to submit his cultivation to Mr. Sekhar. (A Mohi is a person who is appointed to work on the land by the landlord but is not the owner of the land. He has to submit a certain agreed portion of his cultivation to the landlord as a rental for the use of the land.) As he could not reap profits from either of the plots, Mr. Sekhar filed a case against both the widow and the Mohi in Pokhara Court to allow him to use both of the plots. The case subsequently reached the office of the then Prime Minister.

So, this document is an order from the Prime Minister to the *Bichari* of Pokhara Court to decide the case in favor of Mr. Sekhar. And if both the defendants refused to comply with the decision, to order both of them to appear before the Prime Minister's office.



The Mysterious Black Label Depicting the Potala in Lhasa One More Piece of the Puzzle Bo C. Olsson

In his book *The Essays and Proofs of Tibet* Armand E. Singer mentions the mysterious black label depicting the Potala.

The Swedish part of The Relief Committee for Tibetan Refugees in India sold such labels to raise funds. This must have been around 1973-74 (id I remember right). Apparently few were sold since I have not had many answers when trying to advertise for them. I could have missed them totally, but a person who was involved in the work knew I was a collector, so I was notified the committee had received a thin bundle of minisheets from the exile government in Dharmsala. Would I like to buy a few? Yes, indeed!

And I was offered a proof perforation as well. Minihole 9 instead of rouletted 6. A whole minisheet! So far as I know, it is the only such item known, and it is depicted here.

Singer asks in his book what the figure "20" stands for. It is a value and the currency is Indian; i.e., naye paisa. Trangka was not used in Tibet itself at that time. It was probably made invalid after the 1959 revolt or even

earlier. Chinese stamps were sold in Tibet in Chinese currency during 1954-55, so for some time I think both Tibetan and Chinese currency had validity. At least until late 1956 when the Tibetan postal organization finally closed down.

In a number of *The Cinderella Philatelist* many years ago someone speculated that this label had been used for local postage in the Tibetan camps in India. Or, he might have heard a rumor that they were. I can't remember exactly after so many years. Sorry! However, if that was true at least a few such covers should have turned up in the meantime, but none have yet. So, I think we can now be sure that it was just a fund raising label.

Like I said, I have tried to advertise for such labels, but without much success. I did however, get a used copy on piece with a Swedish postmark, showing evidence that they have been used as labels on mail here. It would be interesting to hear if this label was sold in any other countries outside of India.




Bharatpur Branch Post Office Colin Hepper

The Local Pashupati Printings Colin Hepper

All the early collectors and writers on the local Pashupati printings made the assumption that the local printings were started in 1941, because of the difficulties of getting supplies from Perkins Bacon, due to the start of World War II. Later writers (myself included) and some catalogue companies continued to make this assumption without 'switching their brains on'.

During the meeting at WESTPEX, I was in

conversion with Roger Skinner who reminded me that we had all ignored a very well known fact that Perkins Bacon went out of business in the late 1930's, so that the supply of stamps to Nepal and any other country they were suppling would have dried up.

I am sure that this is a much more accurate reason for the need for the Nepalese to start printing their own stamps again, than is the World War II theory.

Our first meeting was Friday afternoon with Frank Vignola, Bill Jansen, Frealon Bibbins, Leo Martyn, Geoffrey Flack, Roger Skinner, Colin Hepper and myself in attendance. The primary business for the meeting was the election of a new President and a new Vice-President. I am very pleased to announce that Colin Hepper is the new President and Geoffrey Flack is the new Vice-President. Their e-mail address are on the inside front cover. There was then time to examine the exhibits and of course. to spend (too much) money buying items from the various dealers. That night Roger and his wife Jo, Colin Hepper and myself and my wife Pat went to Max's for dinner - lot of food and huge desserts.

Sunday we had our general meeting with Geoffrey Flack, Alfonso Zulueta Jr, Roger Skinner, Deepak Jaiswal (a visitor), Frank Vignola, Gerhard Wolf, Colin Hepper and myself in attendance. Hopefully we are once again on the way to having regularly scheduled auctions for the Society.


Cumulative Index for *Postal Himal* and Membership List Richard M. Hanchett






The British-Indian B25 Cancellation Colin Hepper

I would like to comment on the 'New Discovery" of the British-Indian B25 cancellation, reported by Surendra Lal Shrestha in *Postal Himal* 133 (see 'A New Type Discovered on the British-Indian B25 Cancellation by Surendra Lal Shrestha *PH* 133:2 - ed.).

I believe that we should *proceed with caution* before accepting that it is a new type. I have a similar postcard to the one illustrated which was

posted two months earlier, and as can be seen from the illustration, the inking on the lower portion of the date stamp is very clear. On Surendra's card, the inking on the lower portion of the date stamp is almost non-existent and so there is a possibility that the date characters are there but missed being inked making it look as if there was no date stamp. To be sure there must be a full inking of the whole date stamp.




British Envoy at the Court of Nepal Colin Hepper

Some time ago I purchased a small lot of Nepalese material in amongst which was this fine embossed seal on a thin cream coloured card, which may have been cut out from either a letter sheet or an envelope. However, the card seems to be rather too thick to have been used on normal stationery items. I have no idea as to what year this stationery was in use and would be interested to hear from anyone who could throw some light on this position of 'British Envoy at the Court of Nepal', bearing in mind there has always been a British/Indian Embassy in Kathmandu.



Unusual 'Postal Stationery' Colin Hepper



The illustrated cover was posted at Kathmandu G.P.O. on 2 May 1983. The stamp used has been cut out of the 1980 issue postal stationery envelope and placed on a normal envelope.



Another cover also posted at Kathmandu G.P.O. dated 19.10.93 has had the 50p stamp from the 1986 issue aerogramme cut out and used in conjunction with a 1 Rupee stamp for use on an internal airmail letter.


